Our School

St Mary and St Peter is a Voluntary Aided Co-educational Primary School for children aged 4 – 11 in the main school, which is part of the St John the Baptist Multi Academy Trust. We also have a nursery for children aged 3 and 4 years of age. Our school is enriched by close links with St Mary's in Lowestoft, our other Catholic schools within the MAT and our local and global communities.



All class rooms have an interactive whiteboard, reading area and prayer area. There is a large hall which is used for

assemblies, school meals, PE lessons and school Masses. There is also a spacious library, ICT suite and Pastoral room.

The school has large, safe and secure grounds. This includes a EYFS outside area with play apparatus, sand pit and water area. In the main school playground the children have access to a large playing field, trim trail, outside canopy area and our prayer garden. Our wonderful PTA continue to support improvements.

Parent helpers

A Catholic School

St Mary and St Peter is a Catholic school, founded for the education of children from Catholic families. About two-thirds of our current children are Catholics. However, we also welcome children from families of any faith or none. What is important is that you agree with our guiding principles which are based on the teaching of Jesus Christ:

- Cherishing the special nature of each child as a unique human being made in the image of God, providing the care to ensure enjoyment and success in learning, and meeting individual needs.
- Fostering children's sense of personal responsibility, and their ability to stand up for what they know to be right.
- Enabling children to develop relationships through showing generosity, honesty, tolerance and forgiveness.
- Encouraging a concern to help others, both locally and globally, and to care for the environment.

Children learn to live by these values through their daily life as part of the school community. There are frequent opportunities for children to show they care, both formal and informal. Our aim is that, whatever their religious background, all our children should become 'people of goodwill' with a lifelong commitment to creating a more perfect world.

Other aspects of children's experience are more specifically Catholic. Children learn about prayer and worship in their classes, in daily whole-school assemblies and, on special occasions, in our local parish church of St Peter. Worship is always presented in a way that is suitable to children's ages. We are sensitive to the needs of our non-Catholic children, who are never made to feel 'different'.

We hold regular celebrations of the Mass, where the whole school community can come together. We always welcome parents to attend, whether or not they are themselves Catholics.



Religious education lessons are based on the syllabus drawn up by the Diocese of East Anglia. The syllabus encourages children to engage with ideas and the implications of faith. Topics are wide-ranging and include a study of other major world religions. Children also learn about sexuality within the context of Catholic teaching, in a way that is appropriate for their stage of development. We aim for children to accept their own and others' sexuality in a positive light, and to develop relationships in which love, dignity and responsibility are central.

We support our two local churches that sit within our wide parish, St Peter's and St Mary's, in preparing Catholic children for the Reception of First Holy Communion and the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Structure of the school day

We are an “All Weather School” and will send the children out to play at break and lunch, unless we deem it unsafe due to extreme weather conditions eg. Thunder and lightning, very heavy rain etc. Please send your child with appropriate outerwear assuming that they will probably be going outside.

Breakfast Clubs

Breakfast Club is open to children from Reception to Year 6 between 07.45 and 08.30 each day with a cost of £2.50 per session. We are able to accommodate nursery children but please call the office to discuss the procedure for booking nursery children into Breakfast Club.

Breakfast of toast, cereal and juice is provided for children arriving before 8.00 am only. There is the opportunity to take part in sports games or Zumba. At 8.30 am children join their friends on the playground.

All Breakfast Clubs must be booked using the online Wisepay facility. Booking is required by 1.00 pm on the Friday prior to the week of the club be booked. This ensures we have the correct staff to pupil ratio.

After School Clubs

We offer an exciting and varied opportunity for children to take part in After School Clubs which are available to children from Year 1 to Year 6 (we try to offer Reception class a small selection of clubs from the summer term). Clubs are booked on a half-termly basis and are limited to a first come first serve basis. All bookings for clubs are made using the Wisepay website.

School lunches

Hot, nutritious and healthy meals are provided at a cost of £2.30 per day or free if your child is in Reception, Year 1 or 2. All meals must be booked online using the Wisepay system and must be ordered by 23.59 on the Sunday night before the week commences.

In Reception, Y1 and Y2 school meals are freely available to every child. We would like parents to select their child's meals for the week by logging onto Wisepay and ordering their meals they will not be asked for a payment by 23.59 on the Sunday night before the week commences.

For lunch menus please visit our website.

Alternatively, children may bring a healthy packed lunch. Parents sending packed lunches are expected to provide everything your child will need to eat it, for example plastic spoons and forks. Packed lunches must be healthy – no nuts, fizzy drinks, chocolate bars etc. Please do not send your child in to school with cans or glass containers.

Drinking bottles must only contain water – no squash or fizzy drinks.

Admissions

Main School

The school is primarily for the education of Roman Catholic children between the ages of 4 and 11 years. There is no defined catchment area. The Governors are pleased to accept non Roman Catholic students provided the parents agree to support the ethos of the school and there are places available at the time of application.

Standard application forms are issued by the Local Authority Children's Services Department. Parents wishing to apply for a place at St Mary and St Peter Catholic Primary School (whether as a first, second or third option) should also complete the school's application and supplementary information forms and return them to the school office as soon as possible together with the child's original baptism certificate (copies will not be accepted) from the Roman Catholic church. Children who were baptised in another Christian church and subsequently received into the Catholic Church will be treated as those originally baptised into the Catholic Church.

Our Nursery

Our school Nursery is open every morning during the main school term time and is our Early Education offer. We have the same calendar dates as the main school.

We have a Nursery Teacher who is supported by other staff throughout the morning sessions.

Early Education is offered to families 38 weeks of the year. The funded hours can be claimed (to the maximum available)

- Mon 8:45 to 11:45 (3 hours)
- Tues 8:45 to 11:45 (3 hours)
- Wed 8:45 to 11:45 (3 hours)
- Thur 8:45 to 11:45 (3 hours)
- Fri 8:45 to 11:45 (3 hours)

If you are interested in applying for a place in our Nursery, you need to get in touch with Mrs Bird or Mrs Coe in the main school office. Either pop in to speak with them or call them on 01493 445117.

We do not have a specific Admissions policy for nursery but should we be over-subscribed our criteria for offering places would be the same as for our Reception class detailed in our Admissions Policy.

Establishing a partnership

Parents Evenings and Reports

We believe that we can best help your child by establishing a firm partnership between home and school.

Parent consultation evenings are held twice a year - during the autumn and spring terms. Other Information Evenings may be held from time to time, for example about National Assessment arrangements. Towards the end of the summer term you will receive a detailed written report on your child's progress. This can be followed up with a meeting with the class teacher if necessary.

The class teacher will be the point of contact for most day-to-day matters. However, the Pastoral Lead and Head of School will be very happy to meet with parents about more pressing concerns connected with their child's welfare and progress although we do stress that you discuss issues with class teachers in the first instance.

Particularly for the youngest children, there are opportunities for parents to share information with teaching staff at the beginning or end of the school day. However, we ask parents not to linger in the school after 8.50 am so that we can get teaching underway.

Parental Involvement in School

We greatly value voluntary help from parents for school visits, sport, library and some classroom activities. Whether you have a specific skill to share or just wish to help generally, you will be very welcome. Volunteers always work under the supervision of a teacher and undergo a DBS check before they can begin work in school.

Homework

In line with government recommendations, we expect all children to read at home on a daily basis. The youngest children should spend about ten minutes sharing stories with an adult. As they grow older and their reading becomes more independent, the time should increase to twenty minutes.

Children will be set other homework tasks such as times table practice and weekly spellings.

Please ensure that you support your children by setting aside time for homework, and ensuring a quiet place to work. We also ask that parents sign the home-school contact books ('School Diaries') to confirm that homework tasks have been completed.

Contact Book - School Diaries

At the start of every school year, all children are given a home/school contact book called a School Diary. This must come into school every day without fail and it is a vital tool in developing a successful partnership between home and school. Parents and school staff must use the School Diary to relay important messages to each other in the first instance. Further communication can be arranged if necessary. Any change of arrangements regarding collection of your child at the end of the day must be written in this diary. Please do not ring the office at the end of the day. The School Diary is also where children record any reminders they need to share with home as well as their homework tasks and to record daily reading.

Newsletters and School App

Parents are informed via the school app regarding any school new, events and important updates etc. This is then supplemented with our monthly newsletters which are posted on the school app and put on the school website, so that parents can keep up to date with school events - paper copies are available on request.

Information about special events, such as school visits, will be sent by letter via email. We also use text messaging to communicate short or immediate messages.

Please ensure that the contact details we hold are up-to-date, by informing the school office of any changes.

St Mary & St Peter Catholic Primary School is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and young people and expects all staff and volunteers to share this commitment.

Parent Café and Stay and Play

Each term every year group hosts a parent café where parents can come along for the afternoon to take part in activities with their child in the school hall. Tea and biscuits are provided.

Nursery and Reception host Phonics stay and play sessions each term in the EYFS class room.

Both these events are a great opportunity for parents to come into school to have the opportunity to be creative with their child/ren and get an insight into the curriculum.

These dates are published in advance on the school app and in the monthly newsletter.



Developing a love of learning

The National Curriculum

We recognise that a firm grasp of literacy and numeracy skills underpins all learning, and teaching in these areas is given the highest priority. For example, all children have a daily session to develop their understanding of phonics.

The school follows the new National Curriculum. We have our own set of very diverse and child-centred plans to deliver the national curriculum. We supplement these with additional activities to enrich learning so that it is directly relevant to the needs of our children. These plans ensure that the full requirements of all subjects are met, by linking them into thematic units with clear subject learning goals.

Early Years Foundation Stage

Children in the Nursery and the Reception Year follow the Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum. We aim to establish a strong partnership with parents from the beginning, so that together we can cater for children's individual needs. We recognise that all children are unique, and that they learn in different ways and at different rates.

All learning activities are carefully planned to extend children's capability in a wide range of skills. This enables all children to grow in confidence, self-assurance and resilience. In all activities, particular emphasis is placed on developing children's use of language.

The Nursery and Reception classes work closely together, sharing the same well-resourced learning space, indoors and out. This provides a safe and stimulating environment where children can explore their world, develop their creativity and make positive relationships with adults and other children.

Religious Education

Every child is respected as an individual, some of whom are Catholic, or are practising in another faith or who do not practise in any religious faith. All members of our school are recognised as being at different stages of their own 'journey in faith'. As a Catholic school, we have various duties with regard to the Catholic faith and religious development of all of our pupils. It is part of our mission to ensure that all children are enabled to maximise their potential. Ultimately, it is through the education of Gospel values that we help children to understand how these are part of our everyday lives and help us feel a sense of belonging as part of a wider faith community.

Social and Emotional Aspects of Learning

We give systematic attention to key aspects of children's social learning and emotional well-being. Weekly lessons address such areas as understanding another's point of view, working in a group, sticking at things when they get difficult, resolving conflict and managing worries. Acquiring these skills helps children to gain a positive attitude to their learning and to their behaviour. The themes are not covered in isolation, but relate to other features of school life, such as the Junior Leadership Team, circle time and the playground buddy system.

We have recently developed our school's provision to include systems and practices that are developed through the 'Thrive' approach. In doing this, we aim to ensure that we offer everything we possibly can to meet every child's individual social and emotional needs, whatever these may be. The aim of this is to reduce any problem that a child may have that prevents them from learning as well as they could. By removing these barriers, children can access learning as easily as possible and make the best progress possible.

St Mary & St Peter Catholic Primary School is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and young people and expects all staff and volunteers to share this commitment.

The curriculum

EYFS (Nursery and Reception)

In the early years setting at St. Mary and St. Peter Catholic Primary School our aim is for children to be united in God's love to become happy, confident, well rounded individuals with a love for learning. Our children are provided with a safe and stimulating environment that fosters independence and enables them to learn through play, to explore and express their own ideas knowing that they are valued. We are committed to providing the best possible start to their school life, and deliver this through following The Early Years Foundation Stage 'EYFS' which supports children from birth to five years across seven areas of Learning and Development:

The Prime Areas

- Personal, Social, and Emotional Development.
- Communication and Language.
- Physical Development.



The Specific Areas

- Literacy.
- Mathematics.
- Understanding the World.
- Expressive Arts and Design.

The EYFS Characteristics of Effective Learning are embedded in all that we offer:

- Playing and exploring - engagement
- Active learning – motivation
- Creating and thinking critically - thinking



Through our provision we nurture positive attitudes, teach new skills and give the children high quality practical learning experiences ensuring their well-being and success both now and in the future.

Year 1 to Year 6 Curriculum

St Mary and St Peter Catholic Primary School follows the National Curriculum in all subjects.

Our new curriculum focuses on breadth of study and a balance of subjects and skills. High standards in all subjects are insisted upon.

Full policies on all of the curriculum areas are available in school. However, a brief description of each curriculum area follows.

English – Reading

At St Mary and St Peters, we aim for our children to develop a love of books and reading for pleasure; not just at school but as a skill for life. We prioritise the importance of immersing the children in a rich reading culture which securely underpins our whole school curriculum.



Basic reading skills are taught through synthetic phonics and the 'Letters and Sounds' program of study. Children then continue to embed a greater level of understanding through developing a range of comprehension skills. Also underpinning this is a focus on language development and the understanding and use of a rich range of vocabulary.



This is achieved through daily DEAR (Drop Everything And Read) time and the more focussed teaching of guided reading sessions. The reading culture is then enriched by staff understanding the importance of sharing books and the power of storytelling. Likewise, through the award of earning class 'home reading' rewards and children being able to visit and borrow books from the school library.

Overall we are passionately committed to providing the best opportunities for all children to achieve their full potential. We understand that reading provides the crucial foundation for this and to develop pupils with broad horizons who are empathetic analytical thinkers.

English – Writing

At St Mary and St Peter, our aim is to give all children the skills required to communicate effectively. We encourage the children to feel passionate about writing by supporting them to feel confident in their ability. Writing should be purposeful,



and we create these opportunities by writing across the curriculum. We enjoy the writing process, not just the finished result, and strive to improve our writing through the use of phonics, grammar, spelling and punctuation. We give the children the chance to argue, persuade, explain and create pieces in order to express their thoughts and feelings. We want the

children to be inquisitive, thoughtful and creative thinkers and communicators of the world. Our school creates a love of literacy which is taught enthusiastically, encouraging children to share their ideas with each other and the wider community.

Maths

At SMSP we want all of our children to be confident and creative mathematicians. We teach mathematics daily covering all areas of the National Curriculum including number, shape, space and measure. We aim to develop children's fluency, reasoning and problem solving skills to prepare them for a wider range of opportunities later in life and ensure they have the skills they will need.

We teach mathematics by using a range of concrete resources (i.e. Numicon, Base Ten, place value counters etc.) so that children have a true concept of the value of number. We also use a variety of pictorial and abstract representations to further develop fluency. All children in all age groups will have access to these models and equipment, either to support their learning or prove their answers in a variety of different ways.

Children are encouraged to explain their thinking with their peers to develop understanding and use their metacognitive skills to unpick a question. We celebrate misconceptions and view mistakes as a learning process.

Everyday the children get to practice their mental skills before using and applying these in more complex problems both in Maths lessons and within the broader curriculum (i.e Science, D&T, Computing etc). We are passionate about ensuring each of our children has a love of Maths, enabling them to become better problems solvers, communicators and decision makers later in life.

RE

At SMSP we use The Curriculum Directory for RE in Catholic Schools as the foundation of our RE programmes of study. St Mary and St Peter uses the Diocesan Primary Religious Education Curriculum to fulfil our aims and objectives. This uses two schemes of learning "Come and See" and "The Way, The Truth and The Life" and include 2 weeks of learning about Judaism and 2 weeks of a second faith. This Curriculum offers opportunity for the children to develop deepening understanding by the use of cyclical themes that link to the liturgical year. RE is timetabled to provide 10% of the teaching time in the school day and where applicable links are made with other curriculum areas.



Our Religious Education follows the same high-quality provision of teaching and learning as we offer in the rest of the curriculum, as laid down in our teaching and learning policy. We believe that all children should have the opportunity to experience religion through a broad and varied range of opportunities including: Art, Music, Artefacts, Collective worship, the natural world, Visits and visitors, opportunities to ask and respond to 'Big Questions', Relationships and Sex Education.

Relationships Education and Health Education

We teach Relationships Education and Health Education within the context of a Christian understanding of human sexuality rooted in the wisdom and teaching of the Catholic Church.

Given that RHE (Relationships and Health Education) has become a statutory subject for all schools from September 2020, we are embracing "the challenges of creating a happy and successful adult life" by giving pupils knowledge "that will enable them to make informed decisions about their wellbeing, health and relationships" (DFE Statutory Guidance).

We will deliver this teaching through a programme of study called "Life to the Full". The framework of the programme is taken from the Model Catholic RSE Programme by the Catholic Education Service, which has been highlighted by the Department of Education as a work of good practice.

"Life to the Full" is taught by revisiting the same topics at an age-appropriate stage through their school life. The children's learning includes:

- personal health
- physical and emotional wellbeing
- strong emotions
- private parts of the body
- personal relationships
- family structures
- trusted adults
- growing bodies (including puberty, periods and life cycles)
- the dangers of social media
- where babies come from
- an understanding of the Common Good and living in the wider world.

The entire teaching is underpinned with a religious understanding that our deepest identity is as a child of God - created, chosen and loved by God. We make sure that this learning is fully inclusive of all pupils and their families, whatever their circumstances or personal life choices.

Science

At SMSP we want our children to be naturally curious and care about the world around them. Our curriculum has been developed to ensure full coverage of the National Curriculum and to foster a sense of wonder. We are committed to providing a stimulating, engaging and challenging learning experience. We recognise the importance of science in every aspect of daily life, with links to all other areas of the curriculum and global issues both current and future as stewards of God's creation. As one of the core subjects taught in primary schools, we give the teaching and learning of science the prominence that it requires.

We teach science through practical experience, such as observing, hypothesising, testing, measuring, recording and explaining. This is delivered by the child's class teacher to create opportunities investigation and application in context and clear links with the other areas of the curriculum. The structure is based upon the National Curriculum and various areas of science are covered across the school. These include: Scientific Investigation that specifically looks at the skills necessary to understand how to set up an experiment in all topics of science; Life Processes and Living Things which involves the biology of plants and animals, life processes, human biology, classification and ecology; Materials and their Properties introduce the children to a broad study of materials: rocks, minerals and soils; types of materials and their uses; chemical reactions and the theories, which explain the properties of materials; Physical Processes involves a study of electricity and magnetism, light and sound and closely related ideas on forces.

Reference is made to a study of the solar system and the Universe. We look for opportunities for to revisit and extend the children's knowledge. Our approach is enquiry based, balanced with provision of core knowledge and skills practise.

MFL

At St Marys & St Peters Catholic Primary School we are very aware of the importance of learning a Modern Foreign Language. We believe that the learning of a foreign language provides a valuable educational, social and cultural experience for all pupils in our care. Pupils develop communication and literacy skills that lay the foundation for future language learning. They develop linguistic competence, extend their knowledge of how language works and explore differences and similarities between the foreign language and English. Learning another language raises awareness of the multi-lingual and multi-cultural world and introduces an international dimension to pupils' learning, giving them an insight into their own culture and those of others.

The learning of a foreign language provides a medium for cross-curricular learning and for the reinforcement of knowledge, skills and understanding developed in other subjects.

Our aims are to teach pupils to:

- understand and respond to spoken and written language from a variety of authentic sources
- speak with increasing confidence, fluency and spontaneity, finding ways of communicating what they want to say, including through discussion and asking questions, and continually improving the accuracy of their pronunciation and intonation.
- can write at varying length, for different purposes and audiences, using the variety of grammatical structures that they have learnt
- discover and develop an appreciation of a range of writing in the language studied.

In St Marys & St Peters we do this by teaching French throughout the school.

In KS2 pupils have 30-minute weekly lessons using quality online interactive resources. They have opportunities to write in French on a weekly basis.

In Early Years and KSI teachers introduce French to children by teaching the children to answer the register in French, playing games in French and introducing children to basic vocabulary such as the days of week, numbers to ten etc. They also learn how to sing French songs. Children in KSI spend at least 20 minutes a week learning French and as opportunity arises French is incorporated into a range of activities.

Design and Technology

At St. Mary and St. Peter Catholic Primary School, Design and Technology is delivered practically where children develop knowledge and skills in design, structures, mechanisms, electrical control, as well as using a range of materials including food. They learn to think creatively and solve problems to design and make products for a purpose.

Wherever possible DT is linked to other subject areas such as mathematics, science, art and computing, thus enabling pupils to notice connections and patterns in their learning. Our provision encourages pupils to be active learners, developing the confidence to take risks and promoting their resilience to persist with a project when challenges occur.

They develop their own personal skills and knowledge of a wide range of materials and equipment through their work, and they learn to evaluate by identifying what works well, and through discovering what could be improved on in their own and others designs.

Geography

Our new Geography curriculum will allow children to develop a comprehensive understanding of local, regional and world environments. Through fieldwork, mapping and research, children will study these places in depth and gain an understanding of human and physical features. We want children to show an awareness of current global issues and the role they play to shape responsible and conscious citizens for the future. Finally, we want to celebrate the diversity within our world through an understanding of the people, animals and environments within it.



Our Geography curriculum has been divided into 3 keys areas to allow children to develop these geographical skills:

- Autumn – Local Geography: Children will develop knowledge of the human and physical features in the locality of our school through fieldwork and mapping.
- Spring – Place Knowledge: Children will learn about the wider world including Europe, North America and South America.
- Summer – Biomes: Following on from our Spring topic, children will find and study the world's biomes in detail.

History

The past influences all aspects of daily life, so we hope that by learning about the past, the children will have a good understanding of significant people, events and periods of time that have shaped today's society, and that they will develop a sense of self-identity through the study of world history and local heritage.

We aim to inspire children's curiosity and develop skills that enable them to ask questions, make connections and use a wide variety of evidence to develop and challenge their historical knowledge.

In Key Stage One, children are taught to understand chronology by sequencing events and will broaden their vocabulary to include words and phrases that will enable them to talk about and describe events through different mediums.

In Key Stage Two, children will continue to learn about different time periods in British History, the Wider World and Ancient Civilisations. Children will build on skills learnt in Key Stage One and explore how to compare different sources of evidence and look at their suitability in how they portray the past, which will enable them to develop their own sense of perspective of this time, the people and events.

Music

Music is a way in which we celebrate our faith and bring us together as a school community. Through our music curriculum, we aim to encourage children to express themselves creatively using musical instruments and their voices, develop an understanding of music terminology, learn how to work collaboratively and broaden knowledge of music from around the world.

Within the Early Years, children are exposed to music through a combination of adult-led and self-selected play activities. Throughout the school in EYFS, Key Stage One and Key Stage Two, specialist music teachers from the Norfolk Music Hub deliver weekly lessons. Children at our school are given the opportunity to showcase their talents and perform in assemblies, productions and school and community concerts. In addition to this, we also provide lunch time and after school music clubs and offer private music tuition, which is available at an extra cost.

Computing

At SMSP we believe that computing is essential for children to thrive in later life. We offer a broad and creative computing curriculum that ensures that children become digitally literate – are able to use, and express themselves and develop their ideas through, information and communication technology – and are able to access the online world safely and respectfully.

We provide one hour of dedicated computing time each week, and have access to a full suite of desktop computers as well as a set of iPads for each keystage, to help our children learn essential skills creatively and effectively.

Computing has deep links with mathematics, science, and design and technology and provides insights into both natural and artificial systems and our networked computer suite is able to access programs which enable the children to transfer their skills, into other areas of the curriculum. All classes are equipped with interactive whiteboards, DVD players and cameras. Through the use of good ICT provision we educate all children with ICT skills they can use in their daily lives, today and in the future.

PSHE

Children are taught on a daily basis the importance of key values. In our PSHE lessons, we build on these and encourage children to be empathetic, respectful and free-thinking. We discuss key issues in a safe environment, challenging stereotypes and supporting the children in developing their own values and beliefs. We teach the children to value and embrace individuality, encouraging everyone to have the strength to be themselves and communicate their thoughts respectfully.

We strongly believe that the children are the next leaders, thinkers, achievers, and innovators of our world and we support them with key decision-making skills which they will continue to develop throughout their lives.

PE

At SMSP we value PE as a key part of physical and mental wellbeing. We provide a broad and balanced curriculum that teaches our children the necessary skills to engage in



a wide variety of cooperative and competitive games. This provides our children with the opportunity to become physically confident in a way which supports their health and fitness as well as encourage character building and the values of fairness and respect.

as equipment to help children develop their skills in dance and gymnastics. Every class has a dedicated two hours per week of PE lessons as well as opportunities to further develop their skills in a variety of extracurricular clubs, including gymnastics, football, Zumba and archery.

The school has good facilities for both indoor and outdoor sport with ample equipment to

provide good quality PE lessons as well

ALL KS2 classes take part in swimming lessons on a rota basis throughout each academic year. We aim to have all children confident, happy in the water and able to swim a variety of strokes with many swimming at least 25 metres by the time they transfer to High School.

Please note that we do expect all children to wear PE kit (see uniform section). We also insist that children place importance on their safety and that of others. Therefore, no jewellery is permitted to be worn during any PE or swimming session. It is advised that all jewellery is removed at home on the day of your child's PE lesson.

Art

Through the use of Art and Design, children become creative, individual thinkers who can present their ideas using different art forms as a way of understanding and responding to the world.

Children are encouraged to be free in their exploration of the elements of pattern, texture, colour, line, tone, shape, form and space which ensures fun, engagement and enjoyment in art.



Our school wishes to develop the children's use of technique and provide them with access to different artists, crafts people and designers whilst also encouraging them to gain ownership of their own artistic style. We wish to support the children in discovering a life-long appreciation of art, which inspires them to continue to improve their skills long after they leave primary school.

SEND

The Governors and staff recognise that all children have a right to a broad, balanced, relevant and personalised curriculum. We aim to create a happy, educationally exciting and positive environment in which all pupils can develop their full potential with our support. We recognise that children are individuals and that each one has needs special to him or her. Our entire staff team (including the Head of School, Special Educational Needs Coordinator, Class Teacher, Pastoral Learning Mentors, Teaching Assistants and our Parent Support Worker) together with families work to ensure that every child's needs are successfully met and that each child receives the personalised provision they may need.

- No jewellery is permitted except a simple wrist watch, and one pair of small stud earrings
- Long hair must be tied back at all times

Headlice can be a problem in school. We ask parents to check their child's head regularly and if necessary treat immediately. If children have live lice in their hair parents may be required to take their children home to treat them.

There will be no defined period of time when children can wear what is most often referred to as a 'summer uniform.' They will be able to wear whatever clothing is listed above when they choose so that they can be as comfortable as possible in school.

General Appearance

A high standard of personal appearance is expected of all pupils. Earrings may not be worn for PE and should be removed by child beforehand or not worn at all on PE days. Adults at school are not permitted to remove earrings. Hairstyles should not be extreme; this includes unnatural colours and patterns shaved into the hair. Hair accessories should be discreet and functional.

Attendance

To give your child the best possible opportunity to learn, it is essential that he or she attends school regularly and punctually. We do expect all children to arrive at school on time. Legally we are required to monitor absences. We work regularly with our attendance officer and if your child's attendance falls below the school average you will be invited to a meeting to discuss ways to improve it.

If your child is absent from school please telephone to let the office know in the morning of the first day of the absence. There is an answering machine if the office is busy.

Holidays during term time will not be authorised, however exceptional personal circumstances i.e. close family bereavement/funeral, can be discussed with the Head of School when authorisation may be given.

Parents can be fined for taking a child out of school during term time without the school's permission. They could receive a fixed penalty notice if absent from school for 5 consecutive days (10 sessions).

Daily items

All pupils have their own pegs on which to keep their coats and bags. We have limited space in the cloakrooms and would ask that all children's bags be kept to a reasonable size.
